### MEN AGAINST RAPE - TULANE UNIV.

## EDITORIAL

Binge drinking and illegal drugs are major scourges on most residential college campuses. Two major studies - 5 years apart - of hundreds of institutions and thousands of students by Dr. Henry Wechsler of Harvard Medical School confirm that 40-50% of male students and 30-40% of female students drink to get drunk. Illegal drug use hovers around 20-25% of students. The result: violence, vomit, vandalism and victims. Far too many college presidents hide the real truth from parents, alumni and their boards of directors. As a result, their campuses are the high crime areas of their communities: rape, sexual assault, assault, larceny and thousands of students addicted to booze and dope. Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays are the nights to get high. Friday classes are usually 50% attended. Dormitory and fraternity bathroom floors are covered with vomit and urine (at Dartmouth this is called "mung"). Too many college presidents are afraid to require professors to give tests, quizzes and papers due on Fridays. Their excuse for not doing so is called "collegiality". These presidents could mitigate the problems by strict enforcement of State and Federal laws, heavy fines, probation, suspensions and Parental Notification for every citation given to their students. On graduation day far too many graduates are alcoholics and drug dependent.

The problem is lack of leadership and guts. "The poor dears" solution to this mess is to try to change the law instead of enforcing it!

Middlebury College President John McCardell is quoted as saying, "Society expects us to graduate students who have been educated to drink responsibly."<sup>1</sup> He would like to change Federal and State laws to permit 18-year-olds to drink. (John, 20-30% of your entering freshman class are statistically already binge drinkers and drug abusers.)

Dartmouth College President Jim Wright is quoted as saying, "If there were an 18 or 19-year-old drinking age, we could address the issue more favorably. We can't go around sniffing students breath or smelling their cups."<sup>1</sup> (Jim, are you afraid of offending the clique of "Animal House" alumni?)

## UNIVERSITY OF DELAWARE

When colleges gave up “in loco parentis” regarding student behavior in the 1960’s, drug and alcohol use increased dramatically. Although the Warner Amendment, giving colleges and universities the right to notify parents when their child has violated alcohol policies, was enacted in 1998, the University of Delaware instituted a parental notification policy a year earlier, in 1997. The University of Delaware now has what they call a three strikes and you’re out plan: under the new policy, parents are notified after the first violation and students are fined \$50. The second violation brings another call home and a \$100 fine. After the third violation, students are suspended for a semester and forfeit their tuition and any credits earned that semester.

## Campus Incident Reports

### ALCOHOL

#### Bloomsburg University

**Death:** Freshman Jared Drosnock died of alcohol poisoning after drinking beer and 100 proof vodka. He was found on the floor of an off-campus house with a blood alcohol level of .40. At that level the central nervous system, necessary for breathing and heart function, is suppressed. "He went to sleep and never woke up", Columbia County Coroner Michael Kenny said. David Klimowicz, 21, is charged with involuntary manslaughter and related counts for providing two bottles of vodka that were passed around at the party. A videotape shown in a Columbia County court featured Drosnock chugging a bottle of 100 proof vodka during a party. Friends pleaded with him to stop while Klimowicz, the man who is accused of providing the booze, egged him on. *The Daily Collegian (1/31/01)*

#### Manhattan College

**Death:** Christin Draney, 19, was pronounced dead at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center, where she was rushed after collapsing in her dormitory room. Friends told police that Draney began vomiting about 3:30 AM and when she passed out, they called an ambulance. Draney had spent the night with friends at several bars off-campus, using a fake ID to gain entrance, according to police sources. *The Daily News (NY) (4/3/01)*

#### University of Minnesota

**Death:** U. of Minn. freshman Jonathan Thielen, 19, was drinking the night he died. After going to sleep in his loft bed, 5 feet off the floor, he fell out, hitting his head on a chair and suffering a traumat-

ic head injury. When he fell out of bed, at about 1 AM, his friends asked him if he was OK and he said he was so they covered him with a blanket. In the morning when they woke up, they found him dead. The bar owner who had sold him beer that night was acquitted of criminal charges.

#### University of Minnesota

**Death:** The St. Louis County Medical Examiner said that Ken Christiansen, 19, most likely died of hypothermia after falling into a creek on the way home from a rugby team party. Christiansen had a blood alcohol concentration of .22 when he died. Police think he probably was intoxicated to the point where he was confused and slipped into the creek accidentally. Three officers of the University of Minnesota Duluth men's rugby club were charged with furnishing alcohol to minors during the party at which Christiansen and the other rookie players drank beer from kegs. *Star Tribune (4/25/01)*

#### Furman University

**Death:** A blood test showed that Rob Meyerthaler's blood alcohol content was .171 when he fell over the railing of a 22-foot dormitory balcony to his death. Meyerthaler, 19, a freshman at Furman University, was engaged in a spitting contest with two friends when the accident occurred. *Greenville News (3/29/01)*

#### Indiana University

**Death:** The State of Indiana, Indiana University, Theta Chi Fraternity and Bloomington Hospital have all received tort claims notices for wrongful death on behalf of the family of Seth Korona, 19, an IU freshman who died of bleeding in the brain caused by a skull fracture he sustained at a Theta Chi Party. Police said Korona hit his head on a metal door frame after doing a keg stand at the party. No one realized that

he had sustained a head injury at the time, and when his friends found him unresponsive two days later he was taken by ambulance to Bloomington Hospital where doctors suspected meningitis. His head injury was not immediately diagnosed and he remained in a coma until he was removed from life support.

#### Arizona State University and University of Arizona

**Deaths:** Two college students, friends since kindergarten, died in a rollover accident while they were celebrating spring break in Rocky Point (Puerto Penasco), Mexico. Ross Hunter White, 19, a student at the University of Arizona, died at the scene of the accident. The driver, Derek Skarecky, 19, an Arizona State University freshman, suffered serious injuries and was air lifted to the University Medical Center where he died the next day. The vehicle rolled about 90 feet and neither man was wearing a seat belt. One of White's fraternity brothers said that they were going from one party to another. An investigator at the scene said alcohol may have been a factor in the crash. Bottles of alcohol were found in the vehicle.

### ASSAULT

**"The abuse of alcohol is present in 70% of all murders and other violent crime."**

#### SUNY - Oneonta

**Assault:** Student Joseph Olivo, 20, was nearly beaten to death outside an off-campus bar on February 10. Police

arrested Elvis Rodriguez, 20, another student at SUNY, and charged him with first-degree assault. Four other men were also charged with first-degree gang assault. Apparently the fight began between two groups of patrons at The Alley, an off-campus bar that has been the scene of several violent episodes recently. Olivo was hit with both a tire iron and golf club, one blow caving his forehead in and another leaving a hole in his skull on the back of his head. He survived 12 hours of brain surgery and a collapsed lung. Rodriguez was suspended from the college.

## Virginia Tech

**Assault:** Nineteen-year-old freshman Kristin Blair was hospitalized after a janitor assaulted her on campus. James Lee Harris, 20, is charged with attempted murder. The victim apparently had been working in a computer lab when she was assaulted by Harris, an employee of Defender Services of Roanoke. The freshman student had to undergo surgery to repair several damaged vertebrae suffered in the brutal attack. Police have no motive for the attack, and there is no evidence of sexual assault. A background check was apparently performed on Harris by Defender Services before he was hired.

## ATHLETES

### Ranger College

**Gang Rape:** Nine students, including three football players, were arrested for sexually assaulting a 16-year-old girl on campus. On April 21, the victim went with a friend to a party at the men's dorm where alcohol was reportedly being served. Her friend left campus several hours later, and the men allegedly assaulted the girl during a four-hour period in several dorm rooms. All nine men admit having sex with the girl, but have said it was con-

sensual and that they didn't know she was under 18. The men are all currently out on bail and have been expelled from the college. A grand jury is expected to convene on the case in July.

## University of Missouri

**Drugs:** A former Missouri defensive back was convicted of felony drug trafficking and sentenced to nine years in prison in January, but may be released on probation during his first 120 days in prison. The arrest occurred on July 27, 2000, when sophomore John McPherson, 20, was pulled over by a state trooper for driving "in a careless and impudent manner". After receiving permission to search the vehicle, the trooper found approx. 100 lbs. of marijuana in the trunk as well as \$4,031 in the car's console.

## DRUGS

**"Ecstasy, or MDMA, a relatively new designer drug with effects similar to a combination of LSD and speed, is sharply increasing in popularity among teens and young adults. Use has increased more than 1000% since 1995."**

## Athens Tech

**Death:** Chris Allen, 18, an Athens Tech student, died at the hospital after going into seizures at an Athens, GA night club at approximately 2:30 AM. Friends told police that Allen ingested a lethal combination of speed, alcohol and ecstasy.

**Death:** A sophomore, Spencer Oltmann, 19, was found dead in his dormitory room. The coroner ruled the death was caused by an overdose of GHB, or gamma hydroxybutyrate, also known as a date rape drug.

## University of California - Riverside

**Drugs:** During a drug raid on the University of California-Riverside Lambda Phi Epsilon house, police found narcotics including ecstasy, Special K, Vallium, Somacin and LSD. Police obtained the search warrant after an undercover police officer bought drugs from Frank Chi, the president of the fraternity.

## FIRE

### University of Texas

**Death:** A fire May 1 in a privately owned high-rise residence for university students killed one U. of Texas student and critically injured another. Freshman Anoor Hajee, 18, died of asphyxiation in the high-rise, which was built before city codes required sprinkler systems. After more than two months of investigating, fire officials said Hajee, who friends described as a prankster with a history of playing with fire, intentionally set the blaze that killed the 19-year-old business major from Dallas and left Ab Latiff, a Malaysian exchange student, recovering from burns that cover more than 40 percent of his body.

## FRATERNITIES

### Northwestern University

**Hazing:** Administrators indefinitely suspended the Delta Kappa Epsilon fraternity for a Feb. 13 hazing incident that ended with two freshmen pledges hospitalized for alcohol poisoning. Greek Affairs Director Steve Dealph said the pledges participated in an activity called "Ring of Fire" at the off-campus party, where they were encouraged to drink a large amount of alcohol faster than the previous pledge class. After the party, a passerby found one of the pledges lying in a snow bank — the pledge was subsequently hospi-

talized for several days. The intensive care doctor said that in another 20 minutes the student would have died. A second pledge was also hospitalized for a night. DKE's alumni and national organization have since questioned NU's decision to punish the entire fraternity for the mistakes of the three fraternity members who hosted the party. William Banis, VP for student affairs, disagrees: "Look at the consequences — two kids were hospitalized with alcohol poisoning. One was in intensive care for five days and almost lost his life. What do we say — 'Boys will be boys?'"

## Louisiana State Univ.

**Hazing Lawsuit:** Kappa Alpha Psi pledge Brandon Sylve, 20, filed suit against his fraternity and LSU for hazing injuries he sustained earlier in the semester. Sylve received "continuous and systematic beatings involving thrice-weekly paddling and caning" which ultimately required surgery to fight infection and remove dead tissue, as well as a skin graft to close an open wound. LSU withdrew recognition of the fraternity in April, and has banned Kappa Alpha Psi from requesting reinstatement until June 30, 2006. This is the third such disciplinary action by the university since 1997—Sigma Alpha Epsilon was banned after the 1997 alcohol-poisoning death of freshman pledge Benjamin Wynne, and Kappa Sigma fraternity was banned after a 1998 party resulted in alleged alcohol and animal abuse.

## Dartmouth College

**Sex Papers:** After nearly a month of debates, investigations, and intense scrutiny by the national media, Dartmouth decided to permanently derecognize Zeta Psi fraternity on May 11 for the publication of internal newsletters detailing the sexual exploits

of various members. These "sex papers" were distributed to members at weekly meetings and were supposed to be destroyed after each meeting, but an unknown number leaked out and were eventually revealed to the public on April 18. One of the newsletters discusses the brothers' sexual escapades with women, and notes that a future issue will give one member's "patented date rape techniques." Members of Zeta Psi maintain these newsletters were solely satiric in nature and not intended to offend anyone. Dean of Residential Life Martin Redman said the permanent derecognition was appropriate — a fraternity's recognition by Dartmouth "is a privilege, not a right."

## HATE CRIMES

### Boston University

**Death:** A prank cost Boston University student Benjamin Johnson, 20, his life when he fell from the side of a campus building during an attempt to display a swastika from the building's rooftop, according to sources.

## MISSING

### University of California

**Missing:** Chandra Levy, 24, a Washington intern, disappeared a week before she was due to go home to graduate from the University of California. She never arrived and police found her fully packed luggage, her credit cards, her laptop and her cell phone. Her cell phone showed several calls made to Rep. Gary A. Condit (D-Calif.) the day before her disappearance.

### University of Pittsburgh

**Missing:** The body of U. of Pitt. freshman Justin Hayduk—who was missing for more than two months—was found in the Monongehela River. The cause of death was determined to be drowning.

Police have not ruled out foul play, but they theorize that Hayduk simply fell into the river. He was last seen at about 2 AM outside a bar with his friend. When they were approached by police, Hayduk ran. His friend was cited for public intoxication.

## MURDER

### Hofstra University

**Death:** Hofstra University senior Shaun Alexander, 23, was arrested for allegedly stabbing and disemboweling fellow student Max Kolb, 20. He then allegedly kept Kolb's body in the back of his Land Rover for about a week and then at a rented storage facility before allegedly burying the body behind the barbecue in the backyard of a house he rented with other students.

### Eastern Illinois University

**Death:** Shannon MacNamara, 21, a student at Eastern Illinois University, was strangled in her apartment. The suspect, 25-year-old Anthony Mertz, also a student at EIU, spent hours at the crime scene watching, according to friends. He even watched from another apartment with binoculars. At the time the police arrested him, Mertz was out on bond in connection with two separate assault and battery offenses in Charleston.

### University of California - Santa Barbara

**Death:** David Attias, 18, a former UCSB freshman, allegedly ran his car into five pedestrians on a street in Isla Vista, CA, killing four of them and critically wounding a fifth. The results of a blood test taken by the California Highway Patrol the night of the accident have shown traces of THC, a chemical found in marijuana, and Lidocaine, a local anesthetic. A witness at the scene said that Attias announced he was "the

angel of death” and held his arms outstretched, “standing in a Jesus Christ pose.”

## RAPE/SEXUAL ASSAULT

### Arizona State University

**Rape:** Randy C. Begay, 24, was arrested for the March 30 sexual assault of an 18-year-old freshman. Begay, a non-student, entered through the woman’s first-floor dorm window while she was sleeping. There was no sign of forced entry even though the victim said the window was locked. Begay put a hand over her mouth, told her that he had a knife and to keep quiet. The victim did not know her assailant. *The Arizona Republic (4/12/01)*

### U. California-Berkeley

**Acquaintance:** Police are searching for a man who beat and raped a 20-year-old student on campus May 18. The two met for the first time at a nearby bar, and after walking back to campus, the man started making sexual advances toward the woman. When she rejected his advances, he raped and battered her, and then fled the scene. The victim said the man introduced himself as “Todd” when they first met. *Daily Californian (5/29/01)*

### Univ. of Texas-Austin

**Police Officer:** UTPD officer Sellers Bailey III, 36, was charged May 8 with sexually assaulting a student who had been involved in a minor traffic accident on campus April 30. Bailey allegedly asked the woman to get in his patrol car, then drove her to the fifth floor of a UT parking garage where he forced her to perform oral sex on him. The victim retrieved from a trash can paper towels the officer had used and submitted them to police. Bailey was immediately placed on administrative leave,

and submitted his resignation on May 2 after more than 10 years with the university. If convicted, he could face a \$10,000 fine and as many as 20 years in prison. *The Daily Texan (6/4/01)*

**Acquaintance:** A 19-year-old student told police she was raped by two male friends on campus. The woman said they were drinking and playing cards and she passed out—when she awoke three hours later she was naked and the men were getting dressed. *The State News (4/27/01)*

## RIOTS

### University of Maryland

**Riot:** Vice President of student affairs Linda Clement said the Administration is asking for a revision of the Student Code of Conduct to include off-campus jurisdiction after the Final Four post-game riots. Students set sixty fires causing more than \$500,000 in damages to Comcast fiber optic cables, telephone lines and property. Comcast spokesman Mitchell Schmale said, “Comcast is prepared to prosecute these individuals to the fullest extent of the law. The end result is to seek restitution.” More than one thousand students tore down lampposts, lit bonfires, ripped down fences and stole gasoline from residents’ sheds. Students attacked Prince George’s County firefighters by throwing rocks, sticks, bottles and television sets at them as they tried to put out fires.

### Ohio State University

**Riot:** Three off-campus riots were reported this semester, one on April 21 and two on April 29. Police had to fire tear gas, wooden projectiles and flash grenades to break up 2000 violent partygoers. Rioters threw rocks and bottles, taunted and charged police. Auto windows were smashed and an attempt was made to turn over a car. Twelve people were arrested.

There have been six riots since last April worrying officials that rioting is becoming an activity. Ohio State has instituted a zero-tolerance policy to stop out-of-control parties in the off-campus area. Hosts of large parties will be suspended. Hosts will be defined as those people whose name appears on the lease and who are present on the property during the party. *The Lantern (5/16/01, 6/4/01)*

### University of Arizona

**Riot:** Tucson police used stun grenades, rubber bullets and tear gas on April 2 after the University of Arizona lost to Duke University in the NCAA basketball championship. Two thousand fans spilled out of the bars on North Fourth Avenue. Rioters assaulted one another, smashed windows, looted, tore down street signs, overturned five vehicles, set fires that burned a Winnebago and scorched a bar. Police arrested seventeen people. Seven are currently enrolled at the University of Arizona. Police “non-lethal” weapons injured forty people. ## In Memory Jeanne Clery - 1966-1986

April 5, 2001 marks 15 years since our beloved Jeanne was so brutally raped and strangled to death by a fellow Lehigh University student, who initially intended to rob her dormitory room as she slept. The criminal trial determined her assailant to be an alcohol and drug addict with a history of sexual deviance. Our hearts still scream in pain; she was the joy of our lives...our gift from God.

We never would have survived this eternal nightmare without the love and support of our family

and friends, and our faith in God. You all have helped us in making our nation's campuses safer.
