## Dear Friends,

Calling it a powerful tool for students and families, U.S. Secretary of Education Rod Paige announced on November 19, 2001 that the most recent crime statistics for the nation's 6,269 colleges, universities and career schools are now available to the public. These statistics are posted on a U.S. Department of Education web site and can be accessed through the "Crime Stats" area of the Security On Campus, Inc. web site at <http://www.campussafety.org/>.

"In the weeks ahead, students and parents around the country will be making important decisions about postsecondary education," Paige said. "The security and safety on and around our college campuses is one of several factors they will consider. This Web site is a powerful tool that will help families make that important decision, providing them with the latest safety records of our colleges and schools."

The availability of this information to students and parents represents the culmination of more than a decade of work to ensure that our nation's college students aren't kept in the dark about the campus crime dangers they may face. In 1998 Congress named the federal campus crime reporting law the "Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act" in memory of our beloved daughter who was murdered at Lehigh University in 1986, and began requiring the DOE to collect and publicly disclose the statistics. At long last the public has easy access to this information, and the DOE has also realized the importance of making sure students can make informed decisions to avoid crime.

"I applaud the tireless efforts of Jeanne's parents, Connie and Howard Clery, and the thousands of other parents and crime victims who have worked with them," Paige said of our work to save lives on campuses across the nation. "They have turned their grief into advocacy for a law that opens the book on the safety of our college campuses. Now, the American people are empowered with the information they need to make informed decisions about campus safety."

## LEGAL CORNER

### Regulatory Reform Initiative May Threaten Jeanne Clery Act

"Fed. Up" a Congressional regulatory reform effort launched by Rep. Buck McKeon (R-CA) to improve the efficiency of federal financial aid programs may threaten campus crime reporting requirements. Responding to "Fed. Up", the American Council on Education, a higher education industry association long opposed to campus crime reporting legislation, requested that the Jeanne Clery Act be "rewritten" to require colleges to collect and report less campus crime information. Both the Congress and the U.S. Department of Education are expected to consider changes to the law and implementing regulations in the coming year. SOC will monitor this closely and fight any weakening of this important law.

### Clery Act Has Improved Campus Safety

In an e-mail to SOC Senior Vice President S. Daniel Carter, Terry Hartle the Senior Vice President of the American Council on Education, a long-time critic of campus crime reporting legislation, admitted that SOC's work and the Clery Act has made college campuses safer...

*Campuses are far different places with respect to safety than they were 10 years ago. No college deals with crime the way they did before. All colleges have made security improvements in the last decade, often very significant and expensive ones. No college presidents thought much about this issue a decade ago, but they all do so now. A lot more campuses now have security offices. Improvements to lighting are commonplace and most campuses now have escort services... Much of this change is solely attributable to the Clery's and their tireless efforts. — Terry W. Hartle, Senior Vice President, American Council on Education, August 3, 2001*

Recent surveys of students and campus police also indicate that the Clery Act has improved campus safety. Almost one quarter of students surveyed about the Clery Act reported that they had read the summary crime statistics, and a majority (60%) indicated that they had read "other crime related reports, news articles, or flyers." More than four out of ten students indicated that they had made changes in how they protected themselves from harm based on "related information or programs." Campus police officials surveyed (45%) believe that the Act has served as a stimulus for improving the quality of campus law enforcement policies. Dr. Steven M. Janosik an associate professor at Virginia Tech released the results of both surveys during a session at the 11th annual "Legal Issues in Higher Education" conference sponsored by the University of Vermont.

### California Adopts Law Requiring Sex Offenders To Register With Campus Police

In October California became the first state in the nation to pass a comprehensive law requiring convicted sex offenders to register with campus police when they enroll in or become employed on the campus of a college or university. Previously sex offenders could attend college outside of the jurisdiction where they lived and not register with police where they were attending school. The requirement will take effect next October. Under new federal guidelines all states have until October 27, 2002 to adopt similar campus sex offender registries or risk losing a portion of their federal criminal justice grant funding.

### Two New Jersey Colleges Violated Clery Act

Two New Jersey colleges, The College of New Jersey (TCNJ) and Ramapo College, were found in violation of the Clery Act's campus crime reporting requirements according to U.S. Department of Education (DOE) reviews released in 2001. Each school underreported crime, including three forcible sex offenses at TCNJ and 28 burglaries at Ramapo.

### Saint Mary's College Campus Crime Reporting To Get Intensive Federal Review

Saint Mary's College (Notre Dame, IN) was the subject of a December 2001 on-site review by the U.S. Department of Education of the institution's campus security disclosures mandated by the Jeanne Clery Act. Security On Campus, Inc. requested the review last May after several current and former SMC students alleged that the school had underreported sexual assault statistics and not afforded sexual assault victims their required rights.

## DOING THE RIGHT THING

**Notre Dame's President Rev. Edward A. Malloy** decided in October to uphold a ban that kept a former ND football player, Cooper Rego, from returning to campus after he had been expelled three years ago by a disciplinary committee for sexually assaulting another student. Rego had been scheduled to return to campus to play against ND as a member of the West Virginia football team. When Kori Pienovi, the student who had accused him of assault, found out ND was going to allow his return, she went public, allowing her name to be used, and with the support of Security On Campus, Inc. (SOC) and the National Coalition Against Violent Athletes successfully petitioned ND to uphold the ban.

**Penn State's President, Graham Spanier**, bowed to pressure from SOC in November when we demanded that a student recently convicted of sexually assaulting another student not be allowed to graduate. Jean Celestin, a former member of the wrestling team, was given a 6-12 month sentence, far less than the 3-6 years recommended in sentencing guidelines, that would have not begun until after his graduation. Under pressure from SOC, and only weeks before graduation, Penn State banned him from graduation and expelled him for 2 years.

## CLERY ACT TRAINING VIDEO

**The California State University Office of the Chancellor** has developed a comprehensive 30-minute web-based management training video for viewing on its 23 campuses, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Staged as a television news show with news anchor and satellite-fed interviews with experts, the training addresses everything that a CSU campus must do to be in compliance with the Clery Act. ## DR. DAVID SATCHER, U.S. SURGEON GENERAL, ON UNDERAGE DRINKING:

## Campus Incident Reports

### MURDER

#### University of Portland

**Strangling:** In May, soon-to-be senior and residence hall manager Catherine "Kate" Johnson was found murdered in her dorm room on the UP campus. She had been strangled and sexually assaulted. The doors were locked, access was by key cards and there were no signs of forced entry. Employees have submitted to DNA tests at the request of the Portland police. On August 23rd a campus-wide email was sent from University President David Tyson. Any student or employee who "jeopardized the conduct of the Catherine Johnson murder investigation will be subject to immediate termination". At the time the email was issued, freshmen were only a week away from starting classes, yet the investigation had been going on for nearly three months. Speculation was that a likely motive for the email was UP's concern about their image.

#### Alcorn State University

**Shooting:** Student JeKelcy Johnson, 20, a football player, was killed and a second student wounded when they were shot during a campus confrontation. Four people are being held for "joyriding" on campus and were not students. One of them allegedly threw a bottle and it injured a female student. That's when JeKelcy and another student came to her rescue and were shot.

#### Southern University

**Shooting:** Derek Claville, 21, the son of a north Louisiana judge, faces a mandatory life sentence for fatally shooting Robert Stillman, a fellow Southern University student in 1999. He was convicted on a second-degree murder charge and a charge of possession of marijuana with intent to distribute.

### RAPE/SEXUAL ASSAULT

#### College of William & Mary

**Stranger Rape:** Two days after fall classes began, a senior reported that she had been abducted, raped & robbed on campus. The woman was returning to her dorm from a friend's residence near the Health Center when the assailant approached her from behind, taking her into a nearby wooded area where he raped her & took her purse. She made her way to an outdoor emergency phone after the attack & called police about 4:30 a.m. Although no suspect has been identified, DNA has apparently become a crucial aspect of the police investigation.

#### Heidelberg College

**Sexual Assault Videotaping:** Nelson J. Pixler, 20, former Heidelberg wrestler, pled guilty to complicity to sexual battery in a Nov. 1999 rape of an unconscious woman in a dormitory room. Pixler was a freshman when he encouraged former Heidelberg football player Nicholas R. Klinger to commit the assault on a visiting Bowling Green State University coed who had passed out after drinking. The videotape Pixler made of the incident was played for other male students in the dorm. The students pled guilty to the crime and were expelled from school. Klinger was sentenced in July to 4 years in prison, and Pixler could receive the same. Both men will be officially listed as sexually-oriented offenders.

#### Univ. of CA – Santa Barbara

**Sexual Assault Videotaping:** Eight young men were arraigned on charges that included kidnapping and sexual assault. They are suspected in a September 2000 videotaped incident in which a UCSB freshman was allegedly force-fed alcohol, stripped, sexually assaulted with a crutch and a laundry hose, urinated upon, written upon and then left unconscious and covered with

food, beer and garbage on a couch in the street. More than 30 people attending the party witnessed these acts and did nothing.

#### University of Colorado

**Gang Rape:** Sonny Lee, 25, was sentenced to 116 years to life in prison for leading an Aug. 1999 gang rape of a then 20-yr-old UC student in Boulder. Lee was one of 6 men who kidnapped the victim off a Boulder street, sexually assaulted her in their van while driving into the mountains, & continued to rape her repeatedly for several hours. The victim recounted her night of terror at multiple hearings & trials over the past 2 years. She urged fellow sexual assault victims to come forward – "If you don't, nothing will be done. I hope this shows we can make them pay for their crimes."

#### University of Colorado

**Athletes:** Police are investigating an accusation that a female student was raped repeatedly on December 10 at an off-campus party attended by 6 UC football players and up to 15 high school recruits. This marks the 2nd time in four years that a woman said she had been sexually assaulted at a party for football recruits. University spokeswoman Bobbi Barrow referred to this recent incident as "an off-campus drinking party....we do have a code of conduct and, should this be confirmed, there will be an immediate and stern response."

#### Towson University

**DNA Link:** Anthony J. Miller, 30, was charged in July with raping a 20-yr-old TU student March 25, during spring break. Miller then went to jail for a June rape of a 12-yr-old girl – police obtained a blood sample after the June attack & matched it with DNA obtained in the March TU attack.

## Texas Southern University

**Gang Rape:** Two former TSU students convicted of raping a 20-year-old female student in a male dormitory were given probation. The victim said she was taken into a dorm room on Feb. 28, 2001 and attacked – about 10 unidentified men were also present. Vashawn Thomas, 19, received 5 years probation and Hampton Mull, 22, was sentenced to 7 years probation. Each man will also serve 4 months in boot camp & pay up to \$5,000 for psychotherapy the victim may need.

## San Jose State University

**Attempted Rape:** The absence of locks on dorm bathrooms has increased safety concerns after an Aug. 21 incident. A woman was showering about 10:30 p.m. when a stranger who had gained access to the dorm attacked her from behind, placing a paper towel smelling of nail polish remover over her mouth.

## U. of Calif. – Santa Barbara

**GHB Rapes:** Andrew Luster, 37, heir to the Max Factor cosmetics fortune, was arrested in July 2000 & charged with drugging 3 women with the date-rape drug GHB before sexually assaulting & videotaping them in his home. According to court testimony, one of the videotapes confiscated by police shows Luster sexually assaulting an unconscious woman, and another shows him having sex with a woman who is snoring heavily – both women said they had no idea they had sex with him or that the tapes even existed. Two witnesses for the prosecution, both students at UC-Santa Barbara, testified that Luster had drugged them with GHB after they met him in a bar last year. The trial is on-going.

**Deaths:** Clinton Haskins, a University of Wyoming senior, was driving drunk with an expired license at 76 mph on September 16th when he crossed the center line and killed all eight occupants of an oncoming vehicle. The eight men killed were all fellow students: members of the University of Wyoming track and cross-country teams. The crash was the worst highway fatality in Wyoming history.

**Death:** Kevin Johns, a freshman, was reportedly dared to drink 15 shots of hard liquor in 15 minutes during a small Halloween party. He was removed from life support three days later at Presbyterian Hospital.

**Death:** Two Plymouth State College students face criminal charges in the drunk driving death of Charles Chaves, 18. They provided him with the alcohol he drank at a party and he was killed just after he left, when he crashed his car into some trees.

## DRUGS

### Pennsylvania State Univ.

**Death:** Stephanie Yau, 23, a recent graduate of Penn State, died Nov. 5th of a possible overdose of MDMA, commonly known as ecstasy, during a rave party at Tall Shiva Hookah Lounge on College Ave. in University Park. Friends told police it was possibly the first time she ever took the drug.

### Butte College/Chico State College/Univ. of Maryland

**Deaths:** In separate incidents this September, two college students died from GHB, an illegal club drug also used as a "date rape" drug. Alexander Klochkoff, 20, a junior at University of Maryland, was found dead on the porch of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity house at 8 a.m. on September 5th. The chief state medical examiner determined that GHB intoxication contributed to his death. Also in September, Soraya Ali-Omar, 22, a Chico State Kappa Sigma Delta sorority sister, who was on leave from Butte College, was found dead in her bed. Police believe she was the victim of a combination of alcohol and GHB.

### Univ. of NC – Chapel Hill

**Death:** Daniel Scott Walker, 20, a senior journalism and economics major at UNC was found dead in his apartment on Saturday, September 7th. According

to a toxicology report from the medical examiner's office, he had cocaine and oxycodone in his blood – in addition to a blood alcohol level of .10. Oxycodone is the active ingredient of OxyContin, a prescription painkiller that should never be mixed with alcohol.

## University of Connecticut

**Death:** The chief medical examiner's office determined that Peter Gwiazdowski, 20, a dean's list student at University of Connecticut found dead in his dormitory room on October 2nd died of a heroin overdose.

## Framingham State College

**Deaths:** Police found opium, marijuana, drug paraphernalia and possible evidence of drug dealing in the apartment where Eric Tyner, 20, and Andrew Botti-Marino, 18, both Framingham State College students, were found dead at 6 p.m. on November 20th. The two students may have died from smoking marijuana laced with a toxic substance. Police say a bottle of opium marked "poison" was found near the bodies. When Carol Handley, Eric's mother, learned that her son had died, her reaction was not to hide. "I don't want this swept under the rug; I want it to say he died of an accidental drug overdose. I want some kid to say....That could have been me."

## Naperville Central H.S./ Clackamas Comm. College

**Deaths:** Two separate but similar, ground-breaking cases in which Ecstasy dealers face charges for the deaths of customers: An Illinois judge gave Garrett

Harth, 21, the maximum sentence of 15 years in prison for providing Sara Aeschlimann, 18, with the Ecstasy lookalike that killed her.

In Oregon, Jeremy Michael Tomsha, 20, was charged with manslaughter and distributing a controlled substance and may become the first dealer in the city to face prosecution for the death of a customer. Melissa Joy Flaherty, 19, attended a rave party on March 3rd and was taken to the hospital where she died. An autopsy confirmed her death resulted from an overdose of MDA, a more powerful form of the drug Ecstasy.

## Arizona State University

**Professor Arrested:** ASU biology professor Ralph A. Backhaus, 50, was arrested in connection with a three-state Ecstasy ring. According to the Arizona Dept. of Public Safety, the professor, through the university, ordered the chemicals and equipment used to manufacture the drug. According to the police officials, Mr. Backhaus used his scientific expertise to create a sophisticated Ecstasy lab with trade connections that reached to at least two other states, Idaho and California. It takes 2-3 days to produce the drug -a spokesman said "With the equipment seized, he was capable of creating over \$1-million worth of Ecstasy in each processing period."

### Auburn University

**Racial prejudice:** Ten members of Beta Theta Pi fraternity suspended for wearing racially offensive Halloween costumes must be reinstated to Auburn University, Lee County Circuit court Judge Robert Harper ordered on November 21st. This incident was sparked by photographs of the fraternity party being made available for purchase via the Internet. One of the photographs shows two students, both white men. One is in "blackface", on his knees; he is picking cotton from a small bucket. The other, dressed as a policeman, is holding a gun to his head. The fallout from that photograph, and from other recent blackface incidents at several other colleges, has been immense.

## HAZING

### Florida A&M University

**Hazing:** Carl Dozier Edwards, 22, was charged with four counts of aggravated battery in the paddling of freshman students on November 8th. One of the students was beaten so severely that his kidneys temporarily shut down. Florida A&M stands firm in its zero-tolerance policy on hazing and those found guilty will "face extreme consequences," according to FAMU spokesman Eddie Jackson.

**Cadet Hazing:** Keith Briscoe, 23, was awarded \$312,000 by a jury for the brutal hazing he received 6 years ago at one of the oldest schools in the country specializing in military training. During the 2 1/2 months he was at the school in 1995, Briscoe said he endured about 100 incidents of hazing which included being beaten & given "blood wings", which meant having the pin-clip in his uniform insignia pushed into his chest. The student who was instrumental in hazing him was expelled.

**Wrongful Death:** The parents of 19-yr-old Matthew Garofalo settled a wrongful-death claim in Oct. against Chad Diehl, the Lambda Chi Alpha mentor & provider of alcohol to Matt during a 1995 pledge ceremony. Details of the settlement were not disclosed. Matt died on Sept. 7, 1995 from pulmonary edema & fluid in the lungs due to excessive drinking during a "Big Brother/Little Brother" pledge ceremony. The Iowa Supreme Court ruled in Sept. 2000 that the frat was not responsible for his death. Lambda Chi was banned from UI after Matt's death & just reopened this fall. All fraternities voluntarily became alcohol-free in 1998.
