Dear Friends,

It has been 16 years since we lost our beloved daughter, Jeanne, to a brutal murderer. In that time our only comfort has been the work we do to help keep our nation's precious college students safe. Last month's news that a Federal District Court Judge, Anita Brody, threw out Joseph Henry's death sentence saying that instructions to the jury were confusing, stirred up all

the hurt and emotional turmoil all over again. Will the nightmare never end? The setting aside of the death sentence of our daughter's murderer Joseph Henry has been appealed by John Morganelli, the District Attorney for Northampton County in Pennsylvania. Henry was convicted in 1987 of raping and murdering Jeanne in her Lehigh University dormitory after she woke up and discovered him burglarizing her room.

District Attorney Morganelli has indicated that the appeal's success will likely be dependent on a similar Pennsylvania case (Horn v. Banks). The Supreme Court set new standards for jury instructions in 1988. At issue is whether those rulings can be applied retroactively. Pennsylvania officials have said the death sentences of at least 30 other death row inmates (including Jeanne's murderer) are in jeopardy. Sorry to have to update you with this upsetting news.

UNIVERSITY OF MASSACHUSETTS / DARTMOUTH SETS EXAMPLE FOR CAMPUS SAFETY: On May 7, 2002, the UMass Dartmouth Police Department held its first annual community-wide critical incident resource and awareness event on its 710-acre campus located in Dartmouth, Massachusetts. The event titled, "Ready For U", was a UMD Police Department initiative to increase the level of awareness as it relates to the importance of reporting crimes on campus and to expose its campus community to the various local law enforcement partnerships and valuable resources available to respond to a critical incident on campus. Guest speakers Connie Clery and her son, Howard Clery III, of Security on Campus, Inc. relayed the significance of reporting crime on campus and stressed the importance of students taking responsibility for their own safety. A Rape Aggression Defense Demonstration (RAD) was put on by the UMD Police, as well as participation by the Massachusetts State Police Air Wing and Bomb Squad, The Bristol County Sheriff's Office (mobile command center) and K-9 Unit, Dartmouth Police, and Dartmouth Fire. The daylong event also included the Masonic Child Identification Program (CHIP) which offers a comprehensive identification kit, including fingerprints, a "toothprint" dental impression and a short video of the individual speaking. According to the National Center of Missing and Exploited Children, UMass Dartmouth is the first college in the nation to comprehensively I.D. college students. Officer John Souza says "we are hoping to set a trend for colleges across the country to do the same."

Supreme Court Ruling

Colleges and universities which have long cited the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) in withholding campus crime information may be less likely to do so now that the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that violations of the law's educational records confidentiality requirements aren't grounds for individual law suits. In *Gonzaga v. Doe*, decided in June, the Court held that a student couldn't recover financial damages for a FERPA violation in which unsubstantiated sexual misconduct charges were disclosed.

Campuses **Must Be Warned** About Registered Sex Offenders Beginning This Fall

Starting this fall states that don't categorically notify college and university campus communities when a registered sex offender begins working or studying on campus risk losing ten percent of their federal "Byrne Grant" criminal justice funding. The new Bush administration interpretation of the Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act of 2000, a law Security On Campus, Inc. helped to develop and see enacted, will further extend the protections of "Megan's Law" to college campuses.

Harvard University students have filed a Title IX civil rights complaint with the U.S. Department of Education over a controversial new sexual assault policy scheduled to take effect this fall. The complaint alleges that the policy requiring independent corroboration of sexual assault allegations before the school agrees to hear a case will deny women victims

access to "prompt and equitable" grievance procedures as required by law.

Salem International University: The U.S. Department of Education (DOE) in a December 2001 report accused a Salem, West Virginia college of intentionally hiding information about campus crime and **violating the Jeanne Clery Act**. Following a review last summer of Salem International University's reporting practices the DOE found that the underreporting of crime statistics "may have resulted from the deliberate and/or willful acts of one or more university officials." Specifically, the DOE alleges that SIU reported no allegations of forcible sex offenses even though the review team discovered five such allegations during its search of campus crime records.

Lyndon State College Non-compliance: Testimony during a lawsuit between Lyndon State College and the student newspaper revealed that crimes of violence and hate crimes did occur on campus, which the college had denied. Charles Lacallaide, director of security, confirmed on the witness stand that he never let the student paper, the *Caledonian-Record*, see the crime log, and that he's had no training on the Clery Act, and no knowledge of what constitutes a crime of violence under federal law! In annual Clery Act crime statistics, the college has denied there have been any violent crimes or hate incidents since 1997. However, the judge for the case found there have been some violent incidents. On the basis of the information contained in the news article from the *Caledonian-Record*, Security On Campus, Inc. has filed a complaint with the U. S. The California State University Office of the Chancellor has developed a comprehensive 30-minute Clery Act training video, which is now available for ordering at www.calstate.edu/clery. Staged as a television news show with news anchor and satellite-fed interviews with experts, the training addresses everything that a college campus must do to be in compliance with the Clery Act.

CAMPUS INCIDENT REPORTS

In response to the study by the **National Institute of Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism** – which is part of the **National Institutes of Health**, Senator Lieberman (D-CT) held a senate hearing on May 15, 2002 addressing the problem of binge drinking by college students. The consequences of excessive and underage drinking affect virtually all college campuses, college communities, and college students, whether they choose to drink or not.

A Snapshot of *Annual* High-Risk College Drinking Consequences

***Death:** 1,400 college students die each year from alcohol-related unintentional injuries, including motor vehicle crashes.

***Injury:** 500,000 students are injured under the influence of alcohol.

***Assault:** More than 600,000 students are assaulted by another student who has been drinking.

***Sexual Abuse:** More than 70,000 students are victims of alcohol-related sexual assault or date rape.

***Unsafe Sex:** 400,000 students had unprotected sex and more than 100,000 students report having been too intoxicated to know if they consented to having sex.

***Academic Problems:** About 25 percent of college students report academic consequences of their drinking including missing class, falling behind, doing poorly on exams or papers, and receiving lower grades overall.

***Health Problems/Suicide Attempts:** More than 150,000 students develop an alcohol-related health problem and between 1.2 and 1.5 percent of

students indicate that they tried to commit suicide within the past year due to drinking or drug use.

***Drunk Driving:** 2.1 million students drove under the influence of alcohol.

***Vandalism:** About 11 percent of college student drinkers report that they have damaged property while under the influence of alcohol.

MURDER

Campus Murder on Increase

Violent crime on college campuses has taken a disturbing jump recently. Even before a recent spate of shootings, new statistics showed that the murder rate on college campuses almost doubled in 2000. This year alone at Ohio State University there have been 5 deaths by shooting. The Appalachian School of Law in Grundy, VA was put on the map this year when a student shot the dean, a professor and 4 others (three survived.) Ironically, applications almost doubled for the small law school after the tragedy. At Catawba College three students were killed in two separate shooting incidents.

Catawba College

Multiple Murders: Still aching from the death of Andrew Grooms in a dormitory fire in the fall, Catawba College has suffered two separate shooting incidents this spring.

Catawba linebacker Darris Morris, 21, died after being shot in the chest outside a dormitory after a party in January. The gunmen were six students from a neighboring school, Livingston College. Two other Catawba students were also injured in the attack. Police said alcohol was involved. Then, in April, another Catawba College football player and a former team member were fatally shot at an off-campus apartment. Matthew Greear, 19, and Walter Franklin Long V, 19, both died.

Gallaudet University

Murder Trial: Violent images in his mind forced him to kill, Jose Mesa, Jr., 22, testified in his trial on charges of murdering two classmates. Mesa said he is visited regularly by a pair of violent "black hands" which commit crimes in his head and won't leave him alone until he follows exactly what they do. When Mesa was arrested over a year ago for killing Ben Varner and Eric Plunkett he told police that he killed the two fellow students to steal from them. Now he maintains the "black hands" theory. He said he cashed a check he stole from Varner to give a clue to police that would help them catch him and stop him from killing again.

Univ. of Mass. – Amherst

Infanticide: A maintenance worker discovered a dead newborn in a dormitory trash receptacle area May 16. The mother, a UMass freshman, had denied that she was pregnant to dorm mates. Jennifer L. Paluseo wrapped the baby in a towel and put him in the plastic bag that suffocated him, prosecutor Renee Steese said. Paluseo then cleaned blood from the bathroom and dumped the bundle in a trash room after e-mailing her friends about mundane subjects and watching television, Steese said.

Fairleigh Dickinson Univ.

Murder: Tiffany Bratton, 18, was apparently slain in her bed in her dorm room at Fairleigh Dickinson University. Novis Parker, 19, a student at Felician College in New Jersey, her ex-boyfriend, was charged with murder after he told detectives that he was in Ms. Bratton's room Sunday morning and had choked her. *The New York Times (4/16/02)*

Duquesne University

Kidnapping/Murder: Police have charged Jared Henkel, 20, (not a student) Craig Elias, 22, and Jared Lischner, 20, (both Duquesne U. students) with kidnapping and killing Andrew P. Jones, 19, and kidnapping and beating his friend, Anthony Brownlee, 20, both students at Duquesne U. Henkel and Elias wrapped Jones' asphyxiated body in weights and chains, and threw it off a bridge into the river below. The incident began Friday afternoon, March 22, when Henkel called Jones to tell him a safe was missing from a house he rented. Jones and his friend Brownlee then drove to the house where Brownlee told police he was held captive in a bathtub for five hours, while Elias interrogated him about the location of \$5,000 Elias claimed he was owed. According to a police report, Elias hit Brownlee on the knee with a hammer, kicked him in the chest, hit him, slapped him and choked him with a rope. They later released Brownlee when he said he would go get the money. Henkel accompanied him. Brownlee later returned with Jones' stepbrother but Jones and a 1988 Chevy Blazer he borrowed from a friend were missing. Police later found the Blazer. It had been badly burned. Ironically, the two victims were friends with the three murder defendants. Apparently, drug money was at the heart of the tragedy. Jones' body was recovered from the Ohio River on April 12. *Pittsburgh Tribune-Review (3/27/02, 4/12/01, 4/19/02, 4/20/02)*

Appalachian School of Law

Murders: On January 16, a lone gunman entered the fledgling law school and shot six people, among them the school's dean, L. Anthony Sutin, a former Justice Department official who turned his back on Washington to teach the sons and daughters of coal miners. When the rampage was done, three people died, including Sutin, who was shot, execution style, in an office decorated with his 4-year-old son's artwork. The gunman, Peter Odighizuwa, 43, a Nigerian immigrant with four young sons, was a student with failing grades at the school. *The Chicago Tribune (3/5/02)*

University of Portland

Murder: On May 29, 2001, Catherine Johnson, a 21-year-old junior at the University of Portland, was found murdered in her dorm room. She died from manual strangulation and was sexually assaulted. There was no sign of a break-in at the dorm where she was living while the school was not in session. The circumstances were similar to two burglaries, which occurred at the same dorm over spring break, again when the school was not in session. Again there was no sign of forced entry, suggesting that the perpetrator was familiar with UP's calendar and may have had access to a master key. The president of UP, Reverend David Tyson, sent a "damage control" email to all students and university employees more than two months after the murder in which he threatened to fire or expel any person "determined...to have jeopardized the Johnson murder investigation." An even more serious communications blunder came to light six months after the murder: for months UP maintained that the only residents of the dorm were Johnson and one other female student. The truth is a priest was also living in the dorm when Johnson died. Former UP Director of Public Safety,

John Garner says that for years the university has not had adequate control of keys, particularly master keys. What the University has said about campus security, as well as the actions they've taken to address the aftermath of Catherine's death, have demonstrated a disturbing attempt to sweep the entire incident under the carpet.

University of Oklahoma

Murder: An employee of the University of Ohio has been arrested in connection with the shooting murder of a university student. Paul Bruner III, 19, during questioning, admitted to murdering his girlfriend, Cassandra Denise Derrick, 22, a senior majoring in zoology. *The Oklahoma Daily (2/21/02)*

FIRE

Univ. of N.C. - Greensboro

"Prank" Causes Four Deaths: The fire that killed four young adults at the Campus Walk apartments early Feb. 15 may have begun with a woman's Valentine's Day prank against her former boyfriend. According to sources, 23-year-old Janet Danahey went to the apartment building to trash the car of her ex-boyfriend. However, Danahey and her friend could not find the ex-boyfriend's car. Danahey's friend dropped her off and drove away at about 2:30 a.m. That's about the time that a couch on the deck of the ex-boyfriend's apartment was set on fire. A brisk north wind was blowing and the fire, fanned by the wind, swirled through the building's breezeway and up the wooden stairs. Four people didn't make it out and Danahey is charged with four counts of first-degree murder and one count of arson. She may face the death penalty for her "prank". *News & Record (3/3/03)*

FRATERNITIES

Alfred University bans frats

Death: The board of trustees at Alfred University, where Zeta Beta Tau fraternity member Benjamin Klein, 21, was found dead in February, has voted to eliminate fraternities and sororities at the school. "The board is convinced the Greek system is beyond repair", board chairman Robert McComsey said. *The Associated Press (5/22/02)*

ALCOHOL

University of Wisconsin - SP

Alcohol Death: Elvio Misoni, 21, was found dead at 2:48 a.m. on Sunday the 20th of January in his apartment. The cause of death was an alcohol overdose, the coroner's office reported. Misoni's blood alcohol level was 0.425. Test results indicated that Misoni lost consciousness, then breathed vomit into his lungs. This was the sixth student death at UW - Stevens Point this year. *The Associated Press (1/23/02)*

University of Buffalo

Death: The University of Buffalo filed disciplinary charges against three students accused of serving alcohol at a fraternity party to two teenagers involved in a fatal car crash. Two Grand Island teenagers police say were served at the party - Travis Hennigar, 19, and Jeffrey Critelli, 18, later spent several hours at a bar before driving home. They then crashed their car which traveled at upward of 100 mph before it became airborne after hitting a culvert and plunged into the frigid Niagara River. Critelli managed to escape the car and swim to shore. Hennigar, who was driving, is missing and presumed dead. *The Buffalo News (2/14/02, 2/18/02)*

Oregon State University

Alcohol Death: Kappa Sigma Fraternity reopened after remaining closed since OSU student Spencer Haugh's ultimately fatal fall March 1. The fraternity is also temporarily dry, meaning no alcoholic beverages are allowed in the house. Haugh, 20, was visiting at the fraternity when he fell from a second-story fire escape. The junior art student suffered severe head and spinal injuries. He remained in critical condition until his death five days later, after being removed from life support. Haugh's blood alcohol level was above .20. *OSU Daily Barometer (3/12/02)*

University of Scranton

Death: The death of University of Scranton student Robert Skaf following a day of heavy drinking may curtail the futures of some classmates who could go through life with a misdemeanor conviction on their records. "The eleven students will be branded with a record for the rest of their lives," said one of the defense attorneys. "It is not a question of if [individuals will be charged]; it is a question of how many." The district attorney's intention is to charge both students and merchants. Seventeen other students are charged with underage drinking as a result of the investigation sparked by Robert Skaf's death. He was found dead April 28 at the bottom of a stairwell on his 20th birthday. *The Scranton Times-Tribune (5/21/02)*

University of Maryland

Death: Members of the Phi Sigma Kappa fraternity could face criminal charges ranging from hazing to manslaughter in the death of Daniel Reardon, 19, due to alcohol poisoning. Paramedics found Reardon unconscious following a party at the fraternity house early on the morning of Feb. 8. He was in a coma and died on Feb. 14 after being taken off life support. *The Associated Press (3/27/02)*

DRUGS

Ecstasy Use Rising Fast

An increasing number of college freshmen have taken the club drug Ecstasy before they arrive on campus, according to a recent survey by the Partnership for a Drug-Free America. The survey indicated a 140% increase in Ecstasy use among teenagers since 1995, while other drug use remained stable or decreased. Brian Patterson, a clinical specialist at Maryhaven, a drug and alcohol treatment center, said, "Teens often believe they are invincible or don't know the real dangers of Ecstasy". Ecstasy can cause brain damage, potentially fatal dehydration and overheating and can precipitate heart attacks or strokes. In Florida alone last year, there were 25 deaths in which Ecstasy or a variant thereof was listed as a cause of death. *The Lantern (OS U) (2/19/02)*

American University

Drug Ring: District police arrested six American University students on Thursday the 21st of February in a startling late-night raid of four dormitories, the climax of a two-month undercover drug investigation initiated at the request of college officials. The students, all undergraduate men, were charged with possession and intent to distribute marijuana. Police sources said they believe the network has been selling ecstasy and opium, as well as marijuana, for several months. *The Washington Post (2/23/02)*

Penn State University

Drug Bust: Authorities have arrested nearly a dozen people in connection with a drug ring that is alleged to have brought large quantities of ecstasy and cocaine into the college town. When an informant told police in 1999 that two men connected with a

Pittsburgh nightclub were supplying local dealers with up to 8,000 ecstasy pills and cocaine each week, police began to investigate. Ecstasy use at PSU increased dramatically during the same time period.

University of Maine

Drugs: On April 3, State and Federal officials seized what they believed to be the contents of a drug lab for the production of hallucinogens and other illegal drugs in a dorm room on the University of Maine campus.

Heroin Death: Dustin Goodman, 21, was found dead in the basement of the Zeta Psi fraternity of a heroin overdose March 29. Goodman was not a UM student, but was a member of the fraternity.

Florida Atlantic University

Cocaine Death: Former Assistant Public Defender Damon Amedeo, 30, is charged with supplying cocaine to Douglas Rozelle, 18, who was found dead in the lawyer's bedroom. Four days after Rozelle's January 6 death, federal authorities executed a search warrant at Amedeo's West Palm Beach apartment seizing guns and a videotape showing Rozelle snorting cocaine with Amedeo, who was supposed to be helping the victim complete a drug treatment program.

RAPE

Rape Kit Injustice

Medically insured victims of sexual assault in New York and other states are being charged as much as \$1,500 for rape kits despite a federal law requiring states to cover them, Senator Charles Schumer said yesterday. Senator Schumer blamed the problem on the U.S. Dept. of Justice, which he said is responsible

for enforcing a federal law enacted in 2000. Under the law, New York State received a \$7.2 million grant this year to reimburse insurance companies for covering the cost of the kits. Each exam is performed at a hospital after a rape occurs and then the kit is turned over to the authorities as forensic evidence to help identify, arrest and prosecute the rapist.

State U. of West Georgia

Gang Rape: Three university baseball players charged with sexually assaulting a female student were released from jail on condition that they drop out of school and leave the county. Pitcher Benjamin Bryant Hodges, 22, catcher Michael Perez, 22, and infielder Barry Sommer, 21, were arrested after police said they took turns videotaping an attack on an unconscious 20-year-old female student.

University of Colorado

Gang Rape: More than four months after the Dec. 7 incident, prosecutors decided not to pursue sexual assault charges against four University of Colorado football players accused of gang-raping a female student during a party planned for high school football recruits. Investigators submitted 26 specimens to a state lab for DNA testing, but results were "insignificant" to the investigation because of the number of people involved, Chief Mark Beckner said. The victim and her mother, who were told during a two hour meeting that the chance of a conviction was small, were not happy with the decision. Football players Marques Harris, Corey Alexander, Allen Mackey and Ron Monteilh have been charged only with contributing to the delinquency of a minor on the accusation of providing alcohol to the two high school recruits involved. The criminal case is not yet settled. However, the University has charged

these four and five other students with violations of student code. Allen Mackey was suspended **but will be allowed to play football and attend classes!** Boulder County Judge Enichen imposed a requirement that the four not drink any alcohol and submit to daily alcohol testing but **then removed the requirement for alcohol testing!**

HIV: A popular 18-year-old, Nikko Briteramos, a university basketball player, was charged with knowingly exposing a young woman to HIV. Authorities say they believe that at least 50 other people may have been exposed to the AIDS virus, through Nikko and two young women he had sex with.

Univ. of California – Irvine

Rape/Torture: UCI sophomore Brian Dance, a criminology major, was charged with twelve counts of felonies that involved sexually assaulting, beating and torturing a 15-year-old girl he had met on AOL chat on the internet. The victim's hands were bound and her eyes covered with masking tape. The girl was beaten for two hours with a belt buckle, had swastikas carved on her face with a knife, and lost one of her teeth when she was punched. After the incident, the victim and her friends planned a sting to have Dance arrested. One of the girl's friends went on-line and arranged a meeting with Dance. Police officers arrested Dance when the victim identified the suspect at the scene.
