Across the country there remains a demand for effective educational videos on such important topics as campus safety, binge drinking, acquaintance rape, sexual assault, club drugs, and hazing. The students of the Rowan University College of Communication have accepted this challenge and in doing so have produced five extremely well received videos since 1991. These videos continue to be distributed to many hundreds of requesting colleges across the nation. Because of the efforts of Ned Eckhardt and his students, countless numbers of college students have been educated about the potential dangers that await them at college.

In addition to their terrific efforts in video production, in the spring of 2004, the Rowan University Public Relations senior class, headed by Larry Litwin, devoted a semester of work to developing a comprehensive public relations plan for SOC. The materials the PR group distributed and the content they created was priceless. It was an honor for SOC to have such talented students working on and understanding our organization's mission.

Syracuse University received the award for maintaining a caring and committed sworn police force patrolling not only the campus but also the surrounding police district. But most commendably, they received the award for demonstrating the highest commitment to their students' wellbeing by actively encouraging rape victims to report and by providing a 24-hour rape crisis center. Syracuse University was a pioneer in urging students to report their rapes, counseling students, and helping them with programs to prevent rapes. SOC launches first ever Peer Education Program in the high schools

- 44% of college students indulge in HIGH RISK DRINKING

New studies reveal a distressing trend of alcohol and drug abuse in our junior high schools. Latest studies reveal the frontal lobe of the human brain, the part of the brain responsible for decision-making, does not become fully developed until the age of 25.

Our Peer Education program "Safe On Campus" will be the means to get knowledge about sexual assault and the dangers of high-risk drinking to the high school students who need it to protect themselves from becoming victims at college. We will accomplish this in a highly effective and efficient program which will utilize the empathy, connectedness and talents of college juniors and seniors who have "*been there, done that*". We are training enthusiastic, people-oriented college interns to present our educational programs, using our videos – which are already in demand and in use at colleges all over the country - to high school juniors and seniors. Through our work with victims, we at Security On Campus, Inc. see, again and again, how woefully unprepared students are with life-saving information which should not only have been made available to them, but made available in a format which creates a receptive learning mood. Most high schools do have some education about drugs, but education about alcohol (the drug of choice for American youth) and acquaintance rape is inadequate.

More education in time to avert disaster, is necessary. We have already produced the educational videos and have created study guides to accompany each one.

Our first pilot programs are already receiving high praise:

"The SOC video "Breaking the Silence" was compelling, believable and a good mix of moving testimonials and objective facts! The best part of the program were the student facilitators. Having two current college student presenters to "position" the video presentation and moderate the break-out groups was key to getting my senior class to understand how this issue is crucially relevant to their upcoming college careers. We are currently working with Villanova University and Temple University peer educators to fine-tune the presentations and materials. Syracuse University is interested in developing our "Safe On Campus" program in the New York area. We anticipate that, with enough funding, this program will become a welcome resource for campus/high school partnerships across the country.

Given an 80% student-on-student crime rate, efforts to deter campus crime must be engendered from WITHIN the student body.

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION GETS SERIOUS ABOUT CLERY ACT ENFORCEMENT

Salem, West Virginia - In May the U.S. Department of Education (ED) initiated a \$250,000 fine against Salem International University for serious violations of the Jeanne Clery Act. ED found that Salem failed to report nearly a hundred crimes, including 5 forcible sex offenses, between 1997 and 1999, along with other violations.

TENNESSEE IS FIRST STATE TO REQUIRE CAMPUS & LOCAL POLICE COOPERATION ON DEATH & RAPE INVESTIGATIONS

Nashville, Tennessee - In April Tennessee became the first state to require college and local police to work together on death and rape investigations. "Robbie's Law" is named in memory of Robbie Nottingham, whose death on the East Tennessee State University campus last year could not conclusively be explained by campus police who had sent local police away instead of working with them. Nottingham's family believes foul play was involved.

Rape Survivor Speaks Out and Demands Justice

My name is Stacy Bogart and I survived a rape that occurred on the Ohio State University campus in February of 2002. My journey as a victim has been unjustifiable, exhausting, and thoroughly unpredictable. I became consumed by my trauma and am unable to forget. Whether asleep or wide-awake, my subconscious forbids my escape from the horrifying memory. Within days of my attack, I became aware that the "friend" who raped me had also allegedly victimized many other women who remained silent about it. I felt compelled to represent them. These innocent women were silenced by the horror of their ordeal and I felt obligated to ensure that he could not do it again. I decided to pursue both criminal and university charges against my attacker.

I could not help but wonder, why me? If only I had listened to my friends who warned me to stay away from him... If only I had been somewhere else on that night... If only this act of violence could have been prevented! A year and a half after the rape, I learned that my nightmare could have been completely prevented!

After an entire year of suffering from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), with symptoms including nightmares, thoughts of suicide, uncontrollable crying spells, and constant anxiety attacks, something absolutely infuriating and shocking was brought to my attention. The man who raped me had been found to have committed sexual misconduct by an OSU panel for a reported dormitory rape that occurred less than three weeks before my attack! The University chose, however, to merely move the rapist to a different dormitory as punishment, without issuing any warning to the student body. The University allowed him to remain on campus, risking the safety of the rest of the students, and leaving him in the position to rape again.

This discovery paved the way to uncovering even more documents about crimes committed by my attacker before he raped me; The University had documentation of drug possession, an assault on a female, four girls reporting sexual harassment, and fear felt by his roommate. The university was aware that this student was a threat to the health and safety of others, yet allowed him to remain on campus! I was dumbfounded. Enraged. Devastated. Furious. Had the University followed its own rules and lawful obligations, my rape would not have happened. The Ohio State University moved a rapist to another dorm as a punishment. The Ohio State University transformed "the best years" of my life into the worst.

The University continued to fail me even after the rape was reported. Before discovering and contacting Security On Campus, Inc., I was unaware of the rights afforded by the Jeanne Clery Act for victims of sexual assault on university campuses. The Ohio State University did not afford me my rights; I was never transported to the hospital, informed of my options for changing class or dormitory assignments, given information about counseling and advocacy services on campus, or followed up on after reporting the rape. My rape was not listed in the crime log. Instead, my reported rape was treated dismissively by the university. Was it business as usual?

How could the university allow this rapist to remain on campus for over a year after a second similar police report was filed? How could they continue to give no warning to its students of an ongoing threat? Instead, I was forced to beg for justice and the protection of my peers. For over a year full of fearful walks across campus, the administration ignored my countless requests and my mental state began to worsen.

Finally, in September of 2003, the Ohio State University's administrative process provided a hearing on my charges. The rapist was found responsible on all charges, and was expelled from the University. Last summer a Franklin County Grand Jury indicted the rapist on two counts of rape; charges are currently pending. Furthermore, a Clery Act complaint and two lawsuits holding the university and the rapist accountable for their actions against me are pending as well.

As the months pass, I continue to see the power of voice. If only more women spoke out against rape! Too many women remain victims for life. So many innocent women bury the night, pretend it never happened, and prolong their healing process while suffering alone in agony.

There is nothing more empowering than demanding justice that is deserved. This battle has forced me to open up my eyes to the unspoken realities of acquaintance rape on college campuses. Rapists do it more than once. Most victims remain quiet and never report the crime. Administrators have several duties by law that require them to prevent and empower victims of sexual assault on campus. I also learned that not all universities uphold their duties.

Unless we stand up and fight back, countless others will travel down the same road that I did. My prolonged journey as a victim ultimately brought me inner peace and respect. Today I can finally exclaim, "I have reached my destination, I am now a survivor."

SOC note: Due to the publicity of this lawsuit in Ohio other colleges have "gotten the message" that rape must be taken seriously and fair policies must be in place to protect their students. The bravery of women like Stacy "breaking the silence" and standing up to her attacker enables massive social and institutional change.

Breaking the Silence: Understanding Acquaintance Rape

Myth Versus Reality

Rape is an uncommon problem.

- ✓ One in five women age 18 to 24 are the victim of rape or attempted rape while in college

Only strangers commit rape.

- ✓ Up to 90% of victims know their attacker – Most women are raped by acquaintances.

Only certain types of women are raped.

- ✓ No woman is safe from a rape attempt. It does not matter how she dresses, looks, or acts; she is not asking to be raped.

It's O.K. to have sex with a woman who's drunk.

- ✓ Legally, if someone is intoxicated, sex with that person is not considered consensual. **EVEN IF THAT PERSON SAID YES!!**

Women lie about rape as an act of revenge or guilt.

- ✓ FBI statistics report that only 8% of rape charges are unfounded.

Women who don't fight back haven't been raped.

- ✓ A person has been raped when they are forced to have sex against their will, whether they fight back or not. Some people are paralyzed by fear or shock.

The Shocking Statistics

- ⊗ Less than 1 in 20 completed or attempted campus rapes are reported.
- ⊗ Only 1 in 100 are prosecuted.
- ⊗ 43% of college-age males admit to using coercive behavior to have sex.

Be Smart, Don't be Next.

- Keep "tabs" on your friends at bars and parties.
- Learn how to verbally express what you mean in intimate encounters.
- Don't be afraid to take action by leaving the situation or using force if needed.
- Listen to your instincts – don't do things you don't want to do.
- Know with whom you're going home.
- Tell your friends with whom you're leaving and ask them to call and check up.
- If you don't know him well, look out for warning signs of a potential date rapist.
- See the red flags below.

Men: Clear the A.I.R.



Acquaintance rape* is not just a "women's problem", it is EVERYONE'S problem.

Acknowledge: The other person's word. Understand what your partner wants. Don't try to persuade or argue. "No means No." Don't have sex with someone who is too drunk to make responsible decisions, has passed out, or is asleep. Legally, it's rape.

Influence: The actions of other guy friends. Realize that what you say can make an impact. Casual conversation is the best way to influence peers to prevent an incident that could hurt others.

Report: The incident as soon as you know. If you see someone in trouble at a party, don't be afraid to intervene. It is easy to use your cell phone to notify the campus police or someone who you know could stop it.

RED FLAGS:

- ▼ If the guy you're talking to grabs your arm firmly and will not let go.
- ▼ If he is persistent about getting you alone.
- ▼ If he is verbally and/or physically abusive with his friends.

***Anyone can be raped, male or female. The overwhelming majority of rapes are male on female. Up to 10% of rapes are male on male incidents.**

CAMPUS INCIDENT REPORTS

Edward Waters College

Murder: Johnathan Glenn, 18, a freshman from Chicago was shot to death April 29th outside his dormitory on the Edward Waters College campus. According to witnesses he was shot after refusing to give up his basketball jersey. The day before Glenn had submitted a class paper expressing serious concerns about safety on his campus. His parents have since filed suit against the school alleging that inadequate security led to his death, and that campus officials had misrepresented the campus as safe.

University of North Carolina-Wilmington

Murder: 18 year-old Jessica Faulkner was found dead in the dorm room of fellow UNC-Wilmington student Curtis Dixon on May 5th. In addition to first-degree murder Dixon, 22, faces first-degree rape, sexual offense, and kidnapping charges. It has recently been disclosed that Dixon lied on his UNCW application, failing to mention pleading guilty to larceny in 2000 as well as not acknowledging his enrollment in two North Carolina schools prior to UNCW. Dixon has been expelled based on his deception. Dixon placed a phone call to Faulkner's father shortly after the murder confessing his crime. John Faulkner reported that Dixon had been stalking his daughter and trying to date her.

Separately, another UNCW student was expelled for hiding a prior criminal record. John Peck, who pleaded guilty to assault against a female and two counts of crimes against nature in 2001, was expelled shortly after Jessica Faulkner's murder. On June 4th, he shot and killed ex-girlfriend Christen Naujoks, her body found lying on the

sidewalk of her apartment complex.

Just a few days later, he died after a high-speed car chase and gun battle as he was fleeing from the authorities.

WorldNow (6/8/04), Mike S. Adams (6/9/04)

York College

Alcohol Death: 19 year-old Andrew Stephen Hayes had so much to drink on December 12th that he died from alcohol poisoning the next morning. The York College sophomore was found in his on-campus apartment with a 0.35 blood-alcohol count. Hayes was the first student at York College to die from alcohol poisoning in at least the last 15 years.

Fairfield University

Death: 21 year-old senior Francis Marx was killed on May 20th when he was struck in the head by the rear wheel of a bus transporting University of Rhode Island Students participating in a pub-crawl in Newport. Although Marx was not part of the pub-crawl, he and others were on the sidewalk when a confrontation occurred with the URI students. It is uncertain whether Marx fell or was pushed into the street. Three URI students have been charged with disorderly conduct. The bus driver has not yet been charged. Marx was scheduled to graduate May 23rd and to give the valedictory address at Fairfield.

Elizabeth City State University

Murder: On March 1st, Brian Pender was shot to death during a burglary in the house he rented near campus. Three masked men demanded entry to the house, forced him to the floor and shot him before he could escape. The motive apparently was the robbery of a small amount of cash. Neither Pender nor his roommates knew the assailants.

Rocky Mount Telegram (3/3/04)

Ball State University

Murder: While driving home from an off-campus party on March 6th, 20 year-old Karl Harford was robbed and fatally shot by three men he met and offered a ride that night. Police have identified Damien B. Sanders, 21, Brandon L. Patterson, 18, and an unnamed 14 year-old accomplice as being responsible for his murder. There is no indication that drugs or alcohol played a role in the death.

Southern Illinois University

Death: On a weekend camping trip to Cedar Lake, Brent E. Johnson is believed to have drowned after his canoe capsized around 4am on April 3rd, although his body has yet to be recovered. 19-year-old Johnson was in the process of pledging Pi Kappa Alpha at SUI-Carbondale, and was accompanying other pledges and fraternity members on the trip. Pi Kappa Alpha member Bjorn Eric Westland is being charged with delivery of alcohol to a person under 21.

Northeastern University

Death: When 22 year-old Walter Dedrick left a friend's apartment on Tuesday March 16th he was headed back to his own off-campus apartment. Earlier that night he had been thrown out of a bar for being obnoxious, belligerent, and argumentative. The next day, St. Patrick's Day, a friend found Dedrick apparently beaten to death in his apartment. The official cause of death has not yet been disclosed and police have not named any suspects. It appears that he was either attacked or suffered a drunken fall.

University of California-Berkeley

Alcohol Death: The recent death of UC Berkeley junior Steve Saucedo after a night of heavy drinking has awakened new concerns about college binge drinkers. Saucedo died March 21st after playing drinking games in his apartment. While his cause of death remains unknown until a complete toxicology screening has been completed, it is suspected that alcohol poisoning is the cause.

Johns Hopkins University

Homicide: After a fraternity party ended at Sigma Alpha Epsilon's Charles Village apartment house, fraternity member Christopher Elser, a 22 year-old junior from Camden, SC, was stabbed by an intruder. Elser remained on life support before dying the next day. As the only witness to his attacker, Elser was able to give a brief description before collapsing. He did not seem to know or recognize the intruder.

University of North Dakota

Death Update: The body of UND student Dru Sjodin, who had been missing since late November, was found in a ravine north of Crookston, Minn. on April 17th. Sjodin had last been seen November 22nd at the North Dakota Mall where she worked. The search was drawn out so long because of severe weather. Convicted sex offender Alfonso Rodriquez Jr. is pleading not guilty to kidnapping charges.

The Oracle Newspaper (4/19/04)

University of Mississippi

Murder: Demetrius U. Smith, 26, of Lambert, is charged with murder in the drowning of Moss Point native and Ole Miss student Carnesha R. Nelson. 19 year-old Nelson disappeared from her Oxford apartment on May 27th and was found by two fishermen in the Upper Dam of Sardis Lake two days later, what would have been her 20th

birthday. According to police, Smith raped Nelson on Thursday, and then abducted her. Police said officers responded to the call of a resident reporting a woman screaming in the apartment parking lot. When they arrived they found no one in the area. A connection was made between the rape and murder when Nelson's body was found that weekend.

Associated Press (6/2/04) (6/4/04)

University of Wisconsin-La Crosse

Alcohol Death: Jared Dion, 21, became another victim in a series of Mississippi River drownings. On Saturday April 10th, Dion disappeared while leaving for home just after 2am after a night of binge drinking. Friends with him that night say they went to get on a bus back to campus and thought Dion was with them. When they turned around however, he was nowhere to be found. His body was pulled from the river by a dive team five days later.

Norfolk State University

Rape, Murder: Norfolk State junior Kishma Burnes was allegedly murdered by a school employee who was a convicted rapist. The school failed to do a proper background check when hiring Reginald Lee Davis.

The Virginian Pilot (3/6/04)

University of Florida

Murder: Praveen Kumar Vedom, 25, a University of Florida graduate assistant, has been charged with the murder of his friend Sudheer Satti. He was originally charged with the theft of Satti's laptop. Satti was found stabbed several times in his apartment on January 4th. Vedom has been a self-described family friend of the Sattis and after the murder he read a letter, written by the victim's family, to more than 100 mourners at a memorial service.

The Independent Florida Alligator (Feb. 2004)

Western Kentucky University

Rape, Murder Update: Stephen Soules, one of two men arrested in the rape and murder of Katie Autrie, has agreed to a plea agreement with the district attorney's office. In exchange for his testimony against Lucas B. Goodrum, prosecutors have offered Soules life in prison without parole and have taken the death penalty off the table. Soules alleges that Goodrum forced him to kill Autrie. Prosecutors will seek the death penalty against Goodrum.

Bowling Green State University

Alcohol Death: The body of a Bowling Green State University sophomore was pulled out of the Auglaize River in Defiance County, Ohio. Garrit Nixon had drowned on December 27th at approximately 5:45am. He was last seen running from police after somebody made a complaint about a few drunken kids throwing eggs at passing cars. He jumped into the frigid water in an attempt to lose the police that were pursuing him. A police officer tried to help Garrit out of the river but Nixon disengaged and jumped back in.

The Blade (1/29/04)

Rutgers University

Rape: On March 8th, a group of three to five masked men broke into an off-campus apartment, carrying at least a gun and a knife, robbing the residents and their guests, and raping three women. Police have not disclosed how the intruders entered or what was taken from the apartment. Police have arrested Raymond Dargan, 20, Timothy Heard, 18, and Kyle Parker-Hall, 19 in connection with the rapes. A fourth man, Jalon Lassiter, 24, is being sought.

University of Montana

Rape: On March 6th, a 21-year-old female student said she was giving a man, whom she did not know, a ride to his car when he pulled out a high-caliber pistol and forced her to continue driving. They drove to a deserted road where he forced her to perform various sexual acts before she escaped. 24 year-old Brock S. Norling has been arrested and charged with kidnapping, rape, and assault with a weapon.

Montana Kaimin (3/17/04)

Lawson State Community College

Rape: Part-time basketball coach Boris Andrico McCord was charged with first-degree rape and first-degree sodomy. The alleged rape of the 19 year-old player took place on March 6th in a Holiday Inn after a tournament. McCord was previously convicted on charges of involuntary manslaughter of his girlfriend's three year-old son in 1987. Officials at Lawson claim they had no knowledge of McCord's criminal record.

Towson University

Rape: After meeting at a party earlier that night, 18 year-old Justin Patrick Muller invited an intoxicated female student back to his dorm room to watch movies. While sitting there, he attempted to kiss her and she resisted. At that point, he allegedly took off her clothes and raped her. Judicial proceedings are in the preliminary stages.

The Grand Rapids Press (4/8/04)

University of West Florida

Rape: A 19 year-old disabled student was allegedly raped inside her unlocked dorm room by 36 year-old senior Raymond Delaney Bardwell. There is some question as to why the dormitory safety rules were not followed.

Pensacola News Journal (5/27/04)

Penn State University

Drugs: 20 year-old Brett Bell was charged with intent to deliver a controlled substance and possession of a controlled substance when they found three-quarters of a pound of marijuana, packing materials, and a digital scale in his apartment.

Separately, Keith Mancina, 21, arranged a meeting with a task force informant to sell one quarter of a pound of marijuana. He was also charged with possession and intent to deliver, as well as theft by unlawful taking, receiving stolen property, and criminal use of a communication facility.

Overall, 7 students and one State College resident have been charged over the past year and a half.

Collegian Inc. (4/28/04)

George Washington University

Drugs: On January 13th, a GW student was found with 1.5 ounces of marijuana in his Guthridge Hall room, along with other evidence that showed his intent to sell. His room was searched after administrators noticed a suspicious smell emanating from the room. If found guilty of intent to distribute, the student could face up to five years in prison.

The University of Wisconsin

Kidnapping: University of Wisconsin sophomore Audrey Seiler was found on Wednesday March 31st after being missing since the previous Saturday night. According to authorities, what first appeared to be an abduction was actually a planned disappearance. She is being charged with two misdemeanor counts of obstructing an officer and faces a possible nine months in jail and \$10,000 fine for each of these.

George Washington University

Hazing: Delta Tau Delta members at George Washington University suffered sanctions ranging from probation to suspension after it was uncovered that they were subjecting new members to hazing activities. The University has taken measures to protect students from these harmful situations in the future. In addition, national DTD officials have revoked the GW chapter's recognition as of February 17th, and will not allow them back on campus before 2007.

Husson College

Hazing: Husson student Brock Robinson, 25, filed a report on March 28th complaining that members of the Mu Sigma Chi fraternity he was pledging threatened him. This report came after Robinson refused to drink urine as part of pledging activities. According to Husson's Greek Governing board, any forced consumption of food, liquor, drugs, or other substance falls into the category of hazing and is strictly prohibited.

In Memory Jeanne Clery - 1966-1986

April 5, 2004 marks 18 years since our beloved Jeanne was so brutally raped and strangled to death by a fellow Lehigh University student, who initially intended to rob her dormitory room as she slept. The criminal trial determined her assailant to be an alcohol and drug addict with a history of sexual deviance. Our hearts still scream in pain; she was the joy of our lives...our gift from God.

We never would have survived this eternal nightmare without the love and support of our

family and friends, and our faith in God. You all have helped us in making our nation's campuses safer. Only if students are aware of the campus crimes will they take appropriate precautions to protect themselves. Give them timely crime information that they need. Thousands of lives will be saved over the years...maybe someone you know or love. Thank you for caring and helping to save lives on our college campuses.
