Beginning this June, colleges and universities will have an important new tool to help demystify the federal Jeanne Clery Act's crime reporting and victims' rights provisions. SOC, using a generous grant from the U.S. Department of Justice's Office for Victims of Crime, will begin offering a series of day-and-a-half training seminars in various regions nationally.

## Facebook: A Potentially Dangerous New Trend?

We all have the urge to check up on old high school acquaintances or college friends, and thanks to former Harvard student Mark Zuckerberg you can do just that. The website, [www.facebook.com](http://www.facebook.com), allows anyone with a school e-mail address the opportunity to post their picture, create groups and invite friends to join these groups. Facebook has been used as a verb as we hear students saying that they have "facebooked" another student.

Students claim that this is an excellent way to keep in touch with friends, but some schools have reported having serious problems with the site. Administrators fear that students may be revealing too much. According to the Stalking Resource Center (a division of the National Center for Victims of Crime), "Stalking is occurring at an alarming rate and **college students are at greater risk of being stalked than any other population.** According to the most recent Sexual Victimization of College Women Survey, more than 1 in 8, or 13%, of female college students surveyed had been stalked within a 6-9 month period." The California Coalition Against Sexual Assault (CALCASA) published Campus Stalking that underscores the increased risk for stalking behavior on college campuses.

When students use Facebook, **we encourage them to post as little personal information as possible** (do not post address, room number, phone number or class schedules) to prevent stalking or identity theft.

Last year, a sophomore at the University of Kansas suffered the result of revealing too much information. According to the Kansan Campus Newspaper, a man found the student's schedule online and constantly sent her instant messages asking her inappropriate questions. Eventually she was able to block his messages. "I would have never thought someone would go as far as stalking me, but it turned out to be pretty creepy," said the student.

According to the Wesleyan Argus, the new site gives a whole new dimension to people watching. A student states, "There have been some really weird pictures attached to my profile. It is a little weird."

### What should I do if I am being stalked or cyber stalked? (Adapted from [www.safehorizon.com](http://www.safehorizon.com))

- Tell the stalker to leave you alone clearly and firmly. Do not negotiate with the stalker.
- Keep a log of incidents including the date, time, what happened and the names of any witnesses.
- Even if you decide not to prosecute, you may change your mind and the information will be helpful
- Save and print e-mails, instant messages, presents, letters or gifts.
- To keep your address confidential, get a P.O. Box.
- Use an answering machine to screen calls.
- To report telephone harassment and get help in documenting harassment, call the Unlawful Call Center at 1-800-518-5507.
- Have your phone reject anonymous calls.
- Acquaint yourself with 24-hour highly public places in the event that you are ever followed.
- Inform your employer, friends, family and neighbors that you are being stalked.
- Provide a picture of your stalker (if you have one) to your school, employment, etc.

## College Students & Drinking Games

### 50-80% of college students play drinking games.

This past summer, Anheuser-Busch unveiled a game it calls Bud Pong. The company, which makes Budweiser, is promoting Bud Pong tournaments and providing Bud Pong tables, balls and glasses to distributors in 47 markets, including college towns like Oswego, N.Y., and Clemson, S.C.

"It's catching on like wildfire," Anheuser-Busch VP Francine Katz said. "We created it as an icebreaker for young adults to meet each other."

Beer companies have made promoting "responsible drinking" a matter of corporate philosophy, partly as an answer to criticism that they market to youth. But Katz said Bud Pong rules call for water to be used, not beer. Reality, though, may tell a different story. At the Esso Club near Clemson University, Jessica Twilley, a bartender, said she had worked at several Bud Pong events and had "never seen anyone playing with water."

Henry Wechsler, director of the College Alcohol Study at the Harvard School of Public Health, said he was "aghast that companies who posture themselves as promoting responsible drinking promote drinking games, which by their nature involve heavy drinking." As for the Bud Pong water defense, Wechsler said, **"Why would alcohol companies promote games that involve drinking water? It's preposterous."**

Drinking games seem to be most popular among college students, and according to four recent academic studies that surveyed more than 6,000 students nationwide, **50 percent to 80 percent play them**. Students say they enjoy the games because they are a fun way to compete, socialize and drink, and often the only consequence of playing is a hangover. But alcohol prevention experts say the games can lead to alcohol poisoning and drunken-driving crashes, and may increase the chance of sexual assault.

Thomas J. Johnson, a psychologist at Indiana State University, has published seven articles on student alcohol use in peer-reviewed journals since 1998 and has studied thousands of students who play drinking games. He found that **44 percent of men who played said that they did so to sexually manipulate other players. Twenty percent said they had done things after playing a drinking game that could be defined as sexual assault.**

In many games, the more you lose, the more you drink, which leads to losing more and drinking more, a cycle that can quickly spiral out of control.

But more and more colleges, including the **University of Pennsylvania, Fairfield University in Connecticut and Georgetown, are sticking to strict policies that punish students for playing**. "We didn't want to be silent on an issue that really bothers us," said Todd A. Olson, Georgetown's dean of students.

Still, drinking games have become a staple of many young people's social lives, essentially the warm-up, or pre-party, to a long night. On a recent Friday evening at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, Kyle Field, 22, and his friends were watching television in an off-campus house when the clock struck 8:30. "Beer thirty!" someone yelled. "Let's drink!" The quiet gathering suddenly morphed into a symphony of beer-swilling action: one student pulled out a table; another pumped the keg, another filled cups. The group split into two teams of five, including some women, and started playing flip cup, a relay race in which players gulp down an inch of beer in a cup and then try to flip the cup over so it sticks upside down. Field, who was wearing a T-shirt that read collegedrunkefest.com (which lists rules for more than 200 drinking games), warned a struggling teammate, "Don't be the weak link!" After he won his game and drifted off to the bars, Field confided, "The point of drinking games is to get as lit as possible."

The description of this scene distressed the university's chancellor, Walter V. Wender. **"If someone could show me one positive benefit of these games, I'd host one tonight," Wender said. "But there isn't. It's a way to abuse alcohol. Period."** *New York Times 10/16/05*

Within days of the above excerpted article appearing in the *New York Times*, Anheuser-Busch had pulled the beer pong promotion saying they did not want perceptions of the "Bud Pong" game to conflict with a \$500 million campaign to promote responsible drinking. Anheuser-Busch Chief Executive Officer Patrick Stokes said earlier this month the company is looking for ways to keep consumers drinking beer as opposed to cocktails or hard spirits. Even though beer drinking has lost some ground in recent years, Anheuser-Busch remains by far the most dominant U.S. beer company. *AP 10/20/05*

### Hot off the press!

Below are author Alexandra Robbin's answers to questions about her must-read book,

#### Pledged: The Secret Life of Sororities

**In your experience, how widespread do you think hazing is?**

I think the hazing landscape is better than it was ten or even five years ago because schools and organizations have worked to crack down on that behavior. However, many incidents across the country still slip through the cracks, for at least two major reasons. One reason, in my opinion, is that in many groups, hazing is not clearly defined or the adults defining it seem hypocritical. Some coaches insist that hazing-type activities promote team bonding. In Greek groups, national authorities often tell students that anything distinguishing new members from old is hazing; yet these same officials sometimes distinguish new members by giving them pledge-only tests and pins, and withholding secrets from them.

Another reason is that there is still an ongoing debate about whether hazing can be valuable. Many sorority girls told me repeatedly they preferred not to have Greek letters merely handed to them; they want to earn their membership. (Therefore, some Greek groups call non-hazed new members "paper pledges," meaning they're members on paper but not in their hearts.) Some athletes similarly believe they must endure hardships together before they're truly a part of the team.

**Obviously, your book has raised awareness about this problem, what prevention strategies do you see to prevent hazing or unsafe environments in sororities or fraternities?**

Here are two: First, national headquarters need to come up with a clearer definition of what constitutes hazing and why.

Many Greeks are confused by the idea that giving pledges presents counts as hazing. Second, these groups should wipe out the pledge period. If sororities and fraternities are really just social and/or service organizations, it's ridiculous that there's a period during which pledges have to earn the right to be in that group, especially after they've already received the invitation to join. Pledging is what leads to hazing and the hierarchies that make some girls feel they have power over others, which is dangerous.

### CAMPUS INCIDENT REPORTS

#### Murray State University, KY

**Manslaughter:** 20-year-old Burgess Harrison Yonts, the son of a prominent state representative, has been charged with second-degree manslaughter in the death of a 63-year-old Murray State graduate student, Nadia Shahin. Shahin died after being hit by a vehicle, and her body was recovered from a ditch. Evidence from the crime scene was linked to Yonts' vehicle. Yonts was allegedly intoxicated following a party at his Lambda Chi fraternity house at the time of the crime. The national headquarters of Lambda Chi has suspended all activity for the Murray State chapter until further notice. *Associated Press (11/11/2005); Kentucky.com (11/11/2005)*

#### Univ. of California-Berkeley, CA

**Murder:** 19-year-old Meleia Willis-Starbuck, who was a Dartmouth student visiting Berkeley, was allegedly shot and killed by her close friend, 21-year-old Christopher Hollis. The circumstances of the alleged homicide are hazy, with some witnesses saying the shooting was accidental following an argument Willis-Starbuck was having with a group of men outside her

residence, to which she allegedly called Hollis.

#### University of Mississippi

**Murder:** A senior student at Ole Miss, 22-year-old David J. Williams, has been charged with the murder of 21-year-old Demetria L. Bracey, a female student at the university. Bracey had been stabbed in the stomach and police immediately suspected foul play upon discovering her body.

#### Illinois State University

**Murder:** Several weeks after being barred from campus for making sexually inappropriate comments to university students and employees, 27-year-old Maurice Wallace allegedly murdered 21-year-old Olemide Adeyooye. The victim was found in a burned-out chicken coop on October 21 after she had been reported missing. She lived on the same block as the alleged perpetrator, who was not a student at the university. Wallace is charged with first-degree murder, concealing a homicide and theft of a motor vehicle in the death of Adeyooye. If convicted, he faces up to 60 years in prison. *Associated Press (12/1/2005)*

#### Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, VA

**Death:** A \$10,000 reward has been issued for assistance in finding the killer of a young man who was found dead off campus at Virginia Tech. It is unclear whether 18-year-old freshman Brian McCloskey was hit by a car or beaten to death. McCloskey was found badly injured and died at Roanoke hospital 5 days later. Blacksburg police have thus far called the incident an unexplained student death, not a homicide. *Times-Dispatch (11/30/2005)*

#### New York University

**Death / Drunk Driving:** 19-year-old Lower Merion High school actress and star athlete Dina Goldstone died in an automobile accident this summer, after finishing her freshman year at NYU. Goldstone was riding in the car with two other individuals when their car went down into an embankment on Route 97.

Goldstone died on the scene. The driver's blood alcohol content was .149, almost twice the legal limit. *The Philadelphia Inquirer (7/7/2005)*

#### Case Western Reserve Univ., OH

**Murder:** Biswanath Halder, 65, killed one person and injured several others during a seven-hour-shooting spree in 2003. Halder was convicted this December of murder and nearly 200 other charges. Norman Wallace, a 30-year-old student at the university, was killed during the rampage. A faculty member and another student were injured. Halder could receive the death penalty; charges include murder, attempted murder, aggravated burglary and kidnapping. *Associated Press (12/16/2005)*

#### University of Tennessee-Chattanooga, TN

**Gang Rape:** Six football players have been charged with the rape of an 18-year-old female student. The alleged perpetrators are Muhammad Ahmad Abdus-Salaam, Lironnie Davis, DeJuan Payne, Cori Stukes, Terrence Thomas, and Larry White. A seventh player was questioned but not charged. *Chattanooga Times Free Press (11/8/2005)*

#### University of Central Florida

**Rape:** UCF football player Ron Ellis was arrested and charged with a felony count of sexual battery in November. Ellis allegedly sexually assaulted a female student in her dorm room early on November 1, 2005. Ellis has been suspended from the UCF football team indefinitely, and his status at the school and on the team will depend on the outcome of the criminal charges. *USA Today (12/19/2005); Orlando Sentinel (11/15/2005)*

#### Rowan University, NJ

**Rape:** A female freshman was sexually assaulted while walking alone at 2:45 am on Rowan's Glassboro campus. The woman was returning from an off-campus party when she was attacked in a commuter parking lot, officials said. A man got out of a car and dragged her onto a wooded path behind the engineering building. She was raped and then treated at a local hospital, offered counseling, and released. *The Philadelphia Inquirer (11/22/2005)*

### **College of William & Mary, VA**

**Rape / Sexual Assault:** A female student was sexually assaulted in her off-campus apartment on November 13. A man entered the apartment through an unlocked door. The victim was allegedly an acquaintance of the attacker, and was raped at knife-point. The attacker then assaulted her roommates. The college has urged students to attend sexual assault awareness programs on campus.

### **John Carroll University, OH**

**Rape / Sexual Assault:** Six students were allegedly sexually assaulted within the same month on the John Carroll campus. Officials say three of the victims were raped and the others were sexually assaulted. All six of the victims were allegedly assaulted by acquaintances, and police have only sufficient information to investigate one of the six assaults in detail.

### **University of Florida**

**Hazing:** The University of Florida chapter of the Kappa Alpha national fraternity has been suspended for two years as a punishment for hazing. The fraternity's house has been shut down and the University's Greek judicial board may make additional amendments to the Kappa Alpha chapter's fate at UFL.

### **University of Kansas**

**Hazing:** Four pledges have filed lawsuits against a KU fraternity, Phi Kappa Theta, following the fraternity's expulsion from the university due to hazing allegations. The plaintiffs claim the hazing included sleep deprivation, being made to eat goldfish, and being forced to roll around in feces and urine. Last spring, the same fraternity was kicked off campus for a drinking violation. The four plaintiffs are seeking over \$50,000 in damages.

### **Boston University, MA**

**Death:** A BU student was found dead in his off-campus apartment this November due to unknown causes. Junior Andrew Lawrence had allegedly been playing poker with

friends when he excused himself from the game, saying he was feeling ill. His roommate discovered Lawrence's body in the bathroom. Boston police have declared that Lawrence likely died of "natural causes."

### **University of Texas**

**Death:** 18-year-old Phanta "Jack" Phoummarath, a pledge in UT's Lambda Phi Epsilon fraternity house, was found dead in mid-December. Officials do not believe foul play was involved but are awaiting further information. Jack's brother has reportedly said that Jack was undergoing initiation rites and that alcohol was likely involved in his brother's death, but officials have declined to speculate.

### **University of Pennsylvania**

**Suicide:** A senior running back for the University of Pennsylvania football team, 21-year-old Kyle Ambrogi, committed suicide in his mother's Pennsylvania home this October. Ambrogi had been battling depression. His younger brother, sophomore Gregory Ambrogi, also attends the university and is on the football team as well.

**Suicide:** 18-year-old James Dungy, the son of Indianapolis Colts football coach Tony Dungy, was found dead in his Lutz, FL apartment on December 22. James was the second oldest of five children. His death has been declared a suicide based on evidence discovered in his apartment. It has been reported that James Dungy may have struggled with prescription painkiller abuse.

**SOC NOTE:** More than 30,000 people each year in the United States die by suicide. **Adolescent suicide rates are significantly higher than those of the general population. Suicide is the second-leading cause of death of college students.** 95% of those who commit suicide have a mental illness, such as depression, substance abuse, and anxiety.

### **Oregon State University**

**Death / Alcohol:** 18-year-old Lance Strickland was found dead on September 3 in an unoccupied dorm room on the OSU campus. Three Oregon State football players have been indicted in Strickland's death, for furnishing alcohol to Strickland, who was a football recruit. Police say Strickland was partying on the OSU campus with the indicted freshman players the night he died. At the time of death, Lance Strickland's blood alcohol content (B.A.C.) was 0.43, over five times the legal limit.

### **DePaul University, IL**

**Deaths / Drugs:** In early September, a student at DePaul University's Loop campus was found dead of an apparent heroin overdose in his dorm room, and another body, foaming at the mouth, was found on a nearby sidewalk. A dangerous batch of heroin is the likely culprit in both deaths, according to authorities. The victims are 21-year-old Jason Zarka, found in his dorm, and 35-year-old Phillix Williams, found on the sidewalk.

### **Boston College, MA**

**Aggravated Assault / Attempted Murder:** Only two weeks after fleeing Hurricane Katrina and leaving New Orleans' Loyola College, Joseph Vairo, a 19-year-old Boston College student was nearly stabbed to death by alleged Asian gang members. His friend was stabbed as well. Both men survived following the deadly altercation, despite serious injuries.

### **Emory University, GA**

**Aggravated Assault:** Emory junior William Halabi was stabbed outside Maggies, a neighborhood bar and grill, by Tulane student Adam Breit, who had fled Hurricane Katrina. The victim suffered stab wounds to his abdomen but no major organ damage. The altercation allegedly began inside the bar when a group of Tulane and Emory students began to antagonize one another.

**University of Southern California Death / Alcohol and Drugs:** Brent Shapiro was a twenty-five-year-old USC senior who died at a party in October. Following a period of alcohol dependence and 18-months of sobriety Brent thought he could experiment with alcohol. He drank at a party and took a half of a tab of Ecstasy. He went into a coma and died shortly afterward. Shapiro was the son of prominent defense attorney Robert Shapiro, and the death occurred at a Hollywood party.

**SOC NOTE:** The Brent Shapiro Foundation was founded in response to Brent's untimely death and has three purposes. The first is to raise awareness of alcoholism as a disease, both for

children and their parents. The second is to support new and extensive research, in the hopes of identifying a genetic basis for this disease and developing methods of early identification, prevention and treatment. Finally, the Brent Shapiro Foundation hopes to take away the stigma of this disease by creating honest discussions around the country, and educating people that this disease should be treated no differently than any other. It is the foundation's belief that the solution, the answer, and the possible cure lies in a new and different approach. ## Conduct Codes for Athletes

Under what circumstances should athletes lose their eligibility to play? And who should make that call?

To answer such questions, a growing number of colleges are adopting conduct codes for their athletes. The codes, which set both expectations for behavior and punishments for specific infractions, tend to give athletics directors — rather than coaches — the final say on who plays and who sits.

Clear standards help ensure that coaches, players, and fans know what to expect if a star athlete is arrested or in violation of the school's discipline code. With a code in place, there is less room for argument about the fairness of punishments.

Although the National Collegiate Athletic Association enforces restrictions on the recruiting and training of athletes, it leaves conduct questions to the discretion of individual colleges.

SOC approves this trend and would like to see firm policies in place so that schools are not tempted to soften the punishment of star athletes.
